SOMEONE'S IN THE KITCHEN

BROCCOLI SALAD BY ANNETTE ROBBINS

1 head broccoli 10 slices crisp bacon 1 red onion 1/2 cup raisins

1 hour ahead prepare: 1 cup Mayo 2 tbsp white vinegar 1/2 cup sugar (may use Splenda)

Salt and pepper Combine and serve

Preheat oven to 400 degrees In a mixing bowl mix well: 2 cups sugar 2 cups flour 2 eggs 1/2 cup buttermilk to which you have added 1/2 tsp baking soda While this mixture is blending, in a small sauce pan bring to boil: 3 tbsp cocoa (not heaping) 2 sticks melted butter 1 cup of water When it comes to boil add to mixture and blend thoroughly

Pour in a 9 x 12 cake pan and bake for 25 - 30 minutes Chocolate Icing Bring to a boil: 3 tbsp. cocoa 1 stick melted butter 4 tbsp milk Stir constantly so it will not scorch Add to 1 box of confectioner's sugar and blend well. Add 1 tsp vanilla extract You may have to add more powdered sugar for consistency. Spread on hot cake.




